History of the Hayward Volunteer Recognition and Awards Event

This year's celebration is part of a nearly 50-year city tradition that provides a cherished time each year for Hayward to honor outstanding volunteers who give their time and energy to benefit individuals, local human services, non-profits and other programs serving the community.

The tradition had its beginnings in 1977 when a civic club, Hayward First, sponsored an award in honor of former Mayor John Pappas. By 1983, Hayward First had dissolved, and a new community-based committee was formed to continue the awards program with an annual dinner, initially at the former Centennial Hall and later in a large tent raised each fall on the grounds of St. Rose Hospital. Over the years, the number of awardees grew to include not only the Pappas award, but also a lifetime achievement award along with recognitions by Hayward's Mayor and its representative to the Alameda County Board of Supervisors. Gail Steele, who had long been a part of the planning committee for the event as a member of Hayward City Council, continued her involvement after becoming the area's representative on the Alameda County Board of Supervisors in 1992 and officially joined the city as a sponsor. After she passed away in 2020, the Lifetime Achievement Award was named in her honor, and her successors, the late Richard Valle and current Supervisor Elisa Marquez, continued to partner with the city to sponsor this event. Over the years, more than 500 awards have been given to outstanding community volunteers.

The names in this 2025 program form an honor roll of Hayward's finest residents and most selfless volunteers. They have helped to create the Hayward of today, and they inspire us to work for the future.

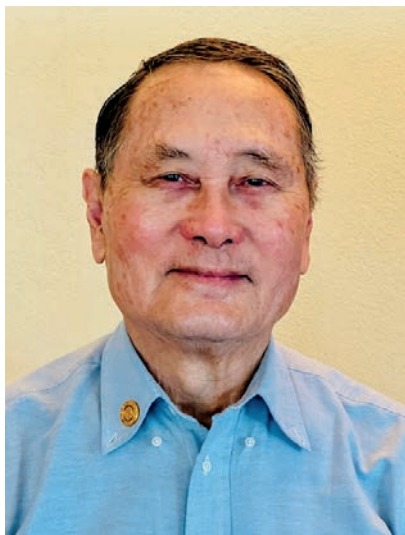
History of the John N. Pappas Humanitarian Award

The Hayward Volunteer Recognition and Awards Dinner started with the establishment of the John N. Pappas Humanitarian Award. In recognition of his lifelong efforts, the award is presented every year to community volunteers who exemplify John's community spirit and ownership.

John Pappas became actively engaged in the City of Hayward in the 1950s. He served on the Mt. Eden School Board and the City's Planning Commission before being elected in 1960 to the Hayward City Council. John served for 16 years and was the last council appointed mayor in 1964. He played an important role in bringing California State University of Hayward, Chabot Community College and two BART stations to Hayward, and founded the George Weekes Branch Library and the Hayward Human Relations Commission. John was a volunteer as well, helping the St. Rose Hospital Building Commission, Eden Youth and Family Center, Hayward Area Historical Society and many more organizations. As an active community member and as a council member, John improved the relationship between the City and residents by encouraging volunteerism.

Until he passed away in 1999, John spoke at every dinner for 22 years to remind guests of the benefits of volunteering. John Pappas supported the volunteer efforts for the overall good of the community and ended with a simple reminder to us all: "People helping people - it's as simple as that."





Robert Sakai

Gail Steele Lifetime Achievement Award

Robert Sakai may be a soft spoken man, but his “wicked” sense of humor and dedication to Hayward have made him a loved and respected member of the community for decades. The City is so grateful for Robert’s lifetime of service, and is very proud and excited to name him our Gail Steele Lifetime Achievement Award recipient.

A Bay Area native, Robert first moved to Hayward in 1948, graduating from Tennyson High School in 1963. After finishing law school at the University of California, Hastings College of the Law in 1974, he spent decades helping clients in the fields of real estate transactions, business, wills, trusts and probate. And as he has enjoyed working with clients, so too has he found joy serving the community.

As a young man, Robert saw Japanese American seniors struggle to find housing, so he co-founded East Bay Issei Housing Inc., formerly the Japanese American Services of the East Bay. There he helped house low-income Japanese American seniors, as well as raise money to establish a residence for elderly members of Hayward’s Japanese community. In addition, he served as the Chair of the Boy Scouts of America, Tres Ranchos District, is the former Director of California State University Hayward’s Foundation and was a director of the Hayward Education Foundation and served on the board of the Hayward Chamber of Commerce.

In April 2008, the Hayward Rotary Club awarded Robert with its highest honor, selecting him as the Outstanding Hayward Rotarian for 2007-2008. Some of Robert’s greatest contributions to Hayward came while serving the community with the Club. While serving as the Hayward Rotary Club President in 2006, Robert was “instrumental” in opening the remodeled Silva Pediatric Clinic at the Eden Youth and Family Center, which will eventually expand and serve a central role in the future Stack Center. As a member of the Investment Committee for the Hayward Rotary Foundation, he has helped grow the foundation’s assets to \$2 million, helping to build a stable and sustainable organization, ensuring that Rotary can serve the community in the coming years and decades.

If you want to congratulate Robert after the ceremony, you might find him at the dessert table – he famously loves sweets. In fact, he was the champion of the Hayward Rotary Club’s ice cream eating contest. “Where do you put it, Bob?” Pam Russo, one of his fellow Rotarians asks. And to that, we say that his capacity for ice cream is only matched by his capacity for kindness and generosity. Thank you for a lifetime of service to the Hayward community!





Lani Llamido

John N. Pappas Humanitarian Award

Lani Llamido's infectious smile and positive energy brighten up any room she's in, and her dedication to Hayward and willingness to lend a helping hand have made her a leader in community service. Lani's work to promote literacy and the arts, support Hayward students and uplift the Asian and Pacific Islander community has left an indelible impact on the community, and the City is proud to recognize her as this year's John N. Pappas Humanitarian Award recipient.

Originally from the Philippines, Lani has chosen Hayward as her home, and the entire community – but especially the staff of Hayward Unified School District – is incredibly thankful to have her here. She was one of 26 members of the inaugural HUSD Parent Ambassador Program and is still an active participant, highlighting school activities, events, programs and services to members of the HUSD community. In her capacity as a parent volunteer, Lani has traveled across the state and country championing HUSD's work. And as one of HUSD's leading parents in the Asian and Pacific Islander Community Initiative, Lani has helped create spaces to celebrate Asian and Pacific Islander culture and helped student organizations like the Winton Middle School Asian Pacific Islander Club thrive.

In 2021, she joined the Hayward Arts Council board of directors. Under Lani's guidance, HAC implemented the first international online exhibition showcasing the works of Palawan Heritage Center indigenous artist Leonard Ansiong in the Philippines. Since then, six international artists have appeared on the HAC website. Her work for the Hayward Literacy Council as a tutor, as well as her efforts to update the website, develop the organization's branding and logo and maintain a social media presence, have helped the Council reach the community and support both childhood and adult literacy.

A highlight of every autumn, Lani buys "giant, giant" bags of candy and books to fill her trunk for Hayward's Trunk or Treat event at the library. And though candy might attract the crowds, she usually runs out of books first. To us, that's emblematic of the gifts Lani has given to the community: Her passion for learning has inspired others to do the same.

And it all started with a community member asking for help, and Lani embracing the call to serve. For that, the City is so grateful, and our community benefits from her contributions every day.





Kamal Anandpuri and 5 Sikh Seva *City of Hayward Mayor's Award*

Their outstanding dedication to the City of Hayward and Hayward Promise Neighborhoods has made a profound impact, ensuring that children and families have access to essential nutrition. 5 Sikh Seva has been an instrumental force in the fight against child hunger in Hayward, and their unwavering commitment to service is truly inspiring.

For years, 5 Sikh Seva has been a vital force in fighting food insecurity in Hayward, ensuring that children and families have access to nutritious meals. Three years ago, they formally partnered with Hayward Promise Neighborhoods to expand their mission, focusing on connecting more Hayward kids and their families to healthy food.

As a central partner in Hayward Promise Neighborhoods, 5 Sikh Seva consistently provides hot, nutritious meals twice a month in the Jackson Triangle neighborhood, serving as a crucial lifeline for families in need. Their commitment extends beyond regular meal distributions. They have also participated in the Hayward Promise Neighborhoods/Hayward Public Library Trunk-or-Treat event for the past five years. They have cooked and served meals for children to make sure they receive nourishment and support in a festive community setting.

Through their dedication, 5 Sikh Seva has cooked and distributed thousands of meals completely free of charge, directly benefiting Hayward's children and families. Their impact is driven by the generosity of donors, as all proceeds go directly toward providing food. Their work is powered by volunteers, including local neighborhood promotoras, who give their time to distribute meals and strengthen their community.

5 Sikh Seva has transformed food access in Hayward, creating a lasting impact on the well-being of local families. Their innovative and compassionate approach has made a difference where it's needed most.

Maria and Alicia Amaya

Alameda County Supervisor's Award

The Office of Alameda County Supervisor Elisa Márquez is proud to recognize Maria Amaya and her daughter, Alicia, as this year's Supervisor's Awardees. Their boundless compassion and advocacy for their community truly reflect the Heart of Hayward.

Maria and Alicia, both raised in Hayward, love serving their community together. When Alicia was only a year old, she would go with her mom to pick up trash all over the city. She is now 8 and still enjoys doing clean-ups, but her dedication to her community now extends far beyond simply picking up trash.

When Alicia was told of the possible closure of St. Rose Hospital, she passionately asked her mom, "What will happen to all the sick people?" St. Rose is only minutes from their home, and both mother and daughter were born at the hospital. They know the vital role St. Rose plays for their community. So, mother and daughter jumped into the effort to stop the closure.

The Amayas are among the 30,000 patients, including thousands of low-income families, who depend on the vital healthcare services provided at St. Rose every year, including its emergency room. Maria has passionately shared her family's story with the media and the California Department of Justice to illustrate the critical importance of keeping the hospital open. In addition to Alicia receiving care for her asthma, both of Maria's parents received life-saving care at St. Rose during the height of the pandemic, where they were intubated for two months to treat collapsed lungs.

During proceedings on the fate of the hospital, Alicia chimed in with her own 3-word speech directly into the microphone, "Save St. Rose!" which became a powerful chant of the regional coalition. Ultimately, their efforts were successful, and both Maria and Alicia are proud to have played a key role in keeping southern Alameda County's only safety-net hospital open.

Maria has done so much to preserve a lifeline in our community; her heart is truly here in Hayward where she has lived her whole life. When she isn't helping to save hospitals, Maria works for the Raising Leaders Program here in Hayward and serves as an unofficial representative for her neighbors with limited access to English.

"I love Hayward," she always says, "I don't think I could ever leave."

And for that, the Supervisor's Office is so grateful for Maria and Alicia's many contributions to our community.

Olasubomi "Shubbie" Aishida

Hayward Rotary Club

In 2020, Shubbie Aishida, who owns the Golden Safari restaurant in downtown Hayward, launched the Peace Haven, a non-profit helping to provide food and meals to families, individuals and organizations including first responders, healthcare workers and seniors, free of charge. Originally a delivery service, the Peace Haven opened a physical location, the Freedom Store, to meet the community's needs during the Covid-19 pandemic. Whether it be children's and adult's apparel in the back corner, tampons and allergy medicines on the far-right shelves, or frozen chicken, meat and food in the freezer, everything in the store is free to the community.

Stanley Robert Cardera

SOS Meals on Wheels

Stanley Robert Cardera has been a dedicated volunteer delivery driver with SOS Meals on Wheels (SOSMOW) since 2016. The 67-year-old Hayward resident was an older-adult college student when he had to pause school and volunteer work to undergo cancer treatment. To help with recovery, a counselor suggested he try an art class. There, Stanley developed a new passion for painting, which he's now using to benefit others. He continues to give back, selling his paintings at flea markets and donating the proceeds to SOSMOW. And while he no longer delivers meals, he has since returned to SOSMOW, where he packages meals in their kitchen.



"My legs and back can't handle the ups and downs of getting in and out of the car and going up and down stairs anymore. But I wanted to go back because I love the people, the energy. Everybody's nice," he said. "I can't do it every day, but maybe I can do a day or two a week. I like to do something positive. I love the atmosphere, so I just look at the brighter side."





Robert Dalby *Hayward Public Library*

The Lawyer in the Library program provided free legal consultations to library patrons; volunteers came and went, but Robert Dalby – an attorney with Berg Injury Lawyers and a Golden Gate University School of Law alum – was always the most reliable, patient and good-humored attorney we worked with. The service Robert provided is hard to overrate. He helped immigrants, low-income seniors, families, entrepreneurs and so many people with limited resources navigate our legal system. He provided reassurance, referrals and good, solid advice on where folks might stand with regard to the law. While this valuable service has come to an end, the Library and its staff are immeasurably grateful to Robert Dalby for all the hours, thought, patience and tremendous heart he put into his volunteer work.

Tom Ferreira *Hayward Concerned Citizens*

Affectionately known as “The Donut Guy,” Tom Ferreira is the definition of a Heart of Hayward. Tom’s kindness, dedication and willingness to serve others can be found in all he does. Tom helped found Hayward Concerned Citizens because he saw the need in our city to give everyone the opportunity to voice their concerns, to provide a source of information for all of its residents and to encourage the volunteerism of others. He has also been a long-term member of the Keep Hayward Clean and Green Task Force, an ambassador for the Chamber of Commerce and has served on the Hayward Rotary Club Board of Directors. If you have driven around the city, you may have caught a glimpse of Tom picking up trash on his own time, often accompanied by one of his children.



Hector Garcia *Hayward Foundation for the Arts*



When Hector Garcia joined Hayward Foundation for the Arts (HFA) two years ago, he became its Treasurer. He developed a payroll deduction that enables HUSD faculty to make monthly contributions to HFA. He educated many of his personal friends about the way HUSD's arts program teaches students to think like professionals and prepares them for careers that will call upon their creativity and that they will love. He also recruits friends to support HFA and volunteer for the organization. Hector's warm personality and knowledge of HUSD's students and community make him a powerfully effective volunteer for HFA and a towering example of the kind of volunteer who makes Hayward a great place to live.





Jeancarlo Garfias Cebrero

Kids' Breakfast Club

Jeancarlo has been a dedicated volunteer with The Kids' Breakfast Club (TKBC) for four incredible years. A Senior at Mt. Eden High School, Jeancarlo has consistently gone above and beyond, giving up his spring and winter breaks to serve his community. Rising as early as 6 a.m., he arrives at TKBC by 7 a.m., ready to cook and serve breakfast to Hayward kids and their families. Whether registering families, coordinating volunteers in the kitchen or leading fun and engaging activities for children, he has done it all with professionalism, empathy and a positive spirit. TKBC serves hundreds of kids each program season, and Jeancarlo has been an essential part of that success. Carl Gorringer

Sun Gallery

Hayward Animal Services

A little over 25 years ago, Rita Herb became aware of the number of kittens born to free-roaming community cats, and she decided to act. She began to humanely trap the cats, take them to a veterinary clinic to get spayed or neutered and vaccinated, and return them to their community. A process referred to today as Trap, Neuter, Vaccinate and Return, or TNVR. TNVR is the most effective method for controlling and reducing cat populations. By addressing the root cause of overpopulation and supporting the well-being of cats, Rita has improved the lives of both the animals and the people who care for them. Rita's legacy in Hayward is a reminder of how one person's compassion and action can create a lasting, positive change for both animals and the people around them.

ECHO Housing

Nicole has been a guest speaker at ECHO Housing's Homebuyer Education workshops for over five years, volunteering her time to provide education to the communities ECHO Housing serves. 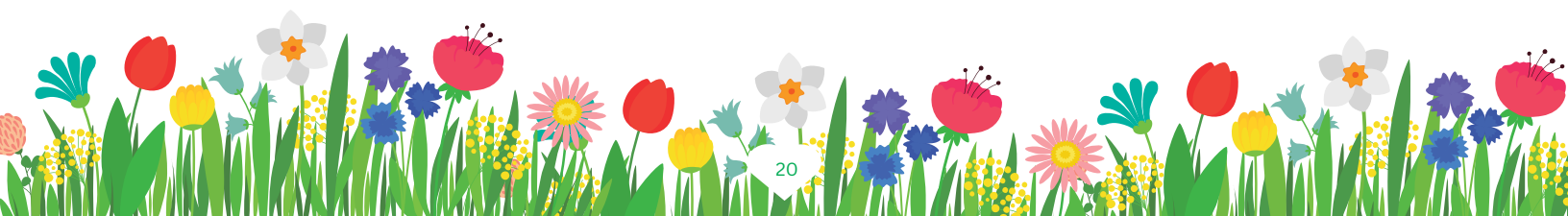
