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3 Tax Witnesses Heard

Alameda County's grand jury investigation into the property tax valuations filed by tax consultant O. W. (Bill) Brothers is expected to enter its third day tomorrow. District Atty. J. Frank Cookley questioned three witnesses this morning, including former Portland tax consultant Homer Goehler, 77.

Goehler, convicted in San Diego and Seattle of bribing assessors, was the leadoff witness. Brothers handled the Alameda account of Georgia-Pacific Lumber Co. for Goehler when the latter was tax consultant for the Portland firm.

Whether Feragen, serving a 1-1/4 year term for conspiracy to bribe public officials, would testify depended on testimony during the day, Cookley said.

The Alameda County Grand Jury is looking into Brothers' dealings when he was consultant for a number of client business firms. Cookley has said he will ask the jury to indict Brothers on five or six counts of perjury.

Other key witnesses today were Ross E. Baxter of Fullerton. He reduced to testimony in January 1966 before another grand jury about his association with Feragen and tax consultant James C. Toole.

Also due on the stand were auditors hired by the county whose audits of the companies uncovered the discrepancies between figures submitted by the companies and the county. Brothers filed with the county \$35,000 in tax dollars in 1966.

Baxter was asked how estimated inventory costs of the companies Brothers represented were knocked down before they were presented to the county.

Skelly, according to Deputy Dist. Atty. Frank Vukota, accepted figures from American Home Products and gave testimony during yesterday's opening testimony, Cookley and Vukota asserted that Brothers slashed \$35,000 in tax dollars from tax valuations of client sales before they were turned in.

The reductions, Vukota claims, resulted in losses of \$28,000 to \$37,000 in tax dollars to the county for each of 28 firms represented by Brothers.

Witnesses for several of the firms they never saw the figures Brothers filed with the county on their behalf.

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Newspaper Drivers OK Contract

Teamsters Union newspaper drivers, by an overwhelming vote, have approved a new 26-month contract with the S. A. Francisco Newspaper Printing Co., printers of the Examiner and Chronicle.

The agreement, approved 358-47 by members of Teamsters local 921, calls for a \$12.65 weekly pay raise effective last October, and a second raise of \$5 a week next October. The previous scale was \$141.35.

The contract, hammered out with the help of federal mediators, ends a strike threat, includes fringe benefit increases, makes a driver's birthday a paid holiday and forbids "moonlighting."

A similar contract was approved by members of Oakland Local 96 who drive for the Oakland Tribune.

School Aide Recall Vote On June 13

UNION CITY - Voters in the New Haven Unified School District will go to the polls June 13 to decide if board members should be recalled.

A recall petition bearing 1,263 signatures was verified today by Rene Davidson, assistant chief of staff of the Alameda County Elections Department.

Davidson said 1,100 of the signatures were certified as those of registered voters in the school district "more than enough for a recall election."

Rock LaFleche, county superintendent of schools, set the election date after Davidson's conference with his staff. The date was chosen because an election had to be set within 75 days after presentation of the petition and because school elections are preferably scheduled while schools are open, Davidson said.

The recall drive is led by Robert W. Smith, director of the Hillview Baptist Church, who has elected chairman of a citizens for Recall Committee.

The recall move was a result of the Rev. Mr. Paulsen's Jan. 24 ban on "unauthorized" movies and other instructional materials and speakers.

Developer Sought For Russel City

Alameda County is ready to begin looking for a buyer for the 200-acre Russel City Regional Area along the Hayward shoreline.

What the Board of Supervisors has in mind is a single purchaser who will buy the entire redevelopment area and turn it into a clean, well-landscaped industry with a high tax base and employment level.

Supervisors set up a special committee yesterday day of Redevelopment Agency executive director Hal Davis, consultant Lewis N. Wolfe and Supervisors Emanuel Razo and John Murphy to set a price on the property.

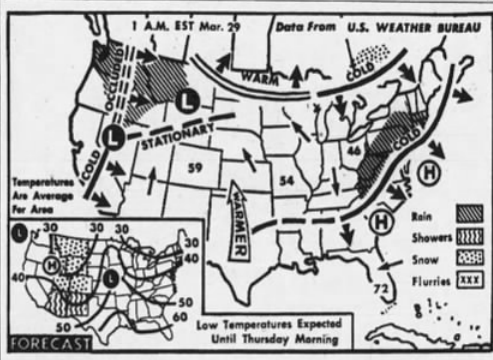
The board decided against open bidding for the property to be sold in two parcels. The county spent \$2,402,000 to acquire it.
